

The artworks in "Back To The Future" are created by artists spanning a period of over 4000 years of artistic creativity from South America and the wider Latin world, which includes works by Jandyra Waters, Delba Marcolini ,Sachiko Koshikoku and Amparo De La Sota. All the works exhibited are realised by female artists from the ancient world to the modern era, the selection of modern paintings and textiles attest to the presence of female creativity in South American arts that spans a time frame of 4000 years is testament to the enduring ingenuity of South American female innovators to express themselves in a most poetic and sophisticated abstract manner. This exhibition is intended to illustrate how works from different periods and cultures are visually interwoven despite their diverse chronological and geographical background, whether it is an affinity in aesthetics or intentionality imbued within the living artist's creations and direct exposure to the Pre-Columbian world.
